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Sample Normal Exam Documentation. Documenting a normal exam of the head, eyes, ears, nose and throat should look something along the lines of the following: Head - The head is normocephalic and atraumatic without tenderness, visible or palpable masses, depressions, or scarring. Hair is of normal texture and evenly distributed.

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Heent Documentation Example

- The HEENT exam is almost entirely a Tier II exam, based on the patient's complaint. If a complete exam is performed, it should be carried out systematically from top (scalp) to bottom (neck).
- Within each portion of the HEENT exam, the regular examination order is followed: Inspection, Palpation.

HEENT Section Physical Examination Transcription Examples. HEENT: Eyes: No scleral icterus or xanthelasma. Mouth: No oral pallor or cyanosis. HEENT: Head and Face: No facial plethora. No signs of trauma. Eyes: Pupils equal and reactive to light bilaterally. Oral cavity pink and moist. There is no oropharyngeal erythema, no exudate. Uvula is midline.

HEENT Section Physical Examination Transcription Examples

The HEENT, or Head, Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Exam is usually the initial part of a general physical exam, after the vital signs. Like other parts of the physical exam, it begins with inspection, and then proceeds to palpation.

As the acronym suggest, the HEENT exam has a few major components: Head (inspection, palpation, and testing of cranial nerves) Eyes (inspection) Ears (inspection, hearing test of cranial nerve) Nose (inspection) Throat (inspection, palpation) HEAD. As stated previously, much of this

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component of the HEENT exam is covered in the cranial nerve exam. With that in mind let us review some of the basics here:

Documenting your findings on a physical exam as well as the reasoning for your plan of care serves as a defense in the event another provider, patient etc. doesn't agree with your actions. Second, documentation helps with continuity of care.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION: Vital Signs: Temperature 100.2, pulse 94, respirations 21 and blood pressure 112/66. General: A well-developed, well-nourished male with pleasant affect. HEENT: Normocephalic and atraumatic. Extraocular movements full. Sclerae anicteric. Neck: Supple. Free of masses or thyromegaly. No carotid bruits. Lungs: Clear.

4 HEENT ANSWER The diagnosis is epiglottitis. The soft-tissue lateral neck radio-graph demonstrates swelling of the epiglottis ("thumbprint" sign, Figure 1.2). The Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) specialist was urgently consulted, and bedside nasopharyngoscopy demonstrated a swollen, red epiglottis with 90% obstruction of the upper airway.

History & Physical Exam. Documentation of the Physical Exam is typically grouped by body system, Nose and Throat (often abbreviated "HEENT"), Respiratory, Sample Write-Up #5; TMs appear normal. Lymph LH is currently afebrile and the HEENT exam did not reveal signs of a bacterial pharyngitis such as tonsillitis ...

HEENT. Head: The skull is normal cephalic, atraumatic (NC/AT). Hair with average texture. No head, sinus, or TMJ tenderness. Eyes: Sclera white, conjunctiva pink. Pupils are 4 mm constricting to 2mm, equally round and reactive to light and accommodations (PERRLA). Red reflex present. Extra-ocular muscle function is intact (EOMI).
